General Works

At least two of the following works should be read in order to cover the basics. They will be relevant to all the classes.

 Comrie, B. (1992), Language Universals and Linguistic Typology: Syntax and Morphology, 2nd edn. (Oxford).

This is a sound introduction, but more advanced than Whaley's work.

2. Croft, W. (1990), Typology and Universals (Cambridge).

Similar in scope to Comrie's book, also more advanced than Whaley.

- Song, J. J. (2001), Linguistic Typology: Morphology and Syntax (Harlow). Probably the most detailed introduction, more advanced than Comrie or Croft; not always easy to read, but with a plethora of information.
- 4. Whaley, L. J. (1997), Introduction to Typology: The Unity and Diversity of Language (Thousand Oaks, London, and New Delhi).

This is highly recommended as a first introduction. The book covers all the basic topics and is very accessible, but for more detail other works are better.
